## WHERE DOES IT ALL HAPPEN?

The new Fr. Val McInnes, O.P. Center for Catholic Life has transformed campus ministry at Tulane Catholic. From attending weekly lectures on important topics that intersect faith, academics and social life, to finding a quiet place to study and pray, or coming to the new chapel for Sunday and weekday Masses, students are always around. The Center is open most nights until ${ }^{11 p m}$ and is especially lively at night!

But a building is just a tool. As Fr. Thomas has said, the building will not make disciples, we must do that. It becomes a place to learn, to pray, to grow, to recharge, to encounter one another, in preparation to go out and live as disciples of Jesus Christ in daily life.

## HOW DID WE GET HERE?

1943 Newman Club receives recognition from the University.
1954 Chaplain Fr. James Benedict purchases building at 1037 Audubon St. to become the Tulane Newman Center.
1966 Dominican friars arrive at Tulane, starting with Fr. Val Mcinnes, O.P.

2000 Campaign begins to renovate existing structure which had become unstable and outdated.

2005 Hurricane Katrina stops progress to renovate Center.
2009 New Campaign begins to replace existing Center with new and larger structure to accommodate growing ministry.

2015 New Center at 1037 Audubon St, named for Fr. Val, opens for the Fall semester, dedicated by Archbishop Aymond.

## WHERE DO THEY GO? Meet some Tulane Catholic grads...

The numbers definitely show a lot of growth, but the real test of a campus ministry is what happens after college. An easy way to tell if we've had an impact is whether a student gets involved in a parish and people there say "Thank you, God, for sending her to us!" Then we'll know that we've prepared students for their life-long vocations.

College Campus Ministry is critical to the life of the Church--college is the place today where young people are deciding how they will impact the world and what values will direct that decision. A top-tier university like Tulane educates many of tomorrow's leaders in business, law, medicine, engineering and other professional areas. But without a strong moral and spiritual formation, how will young people choose to use what they have learned? For themselves, for others, for something greater?

In other words, it's the difference between wanting to promote myself, get rich, become famous, be "successful"... or to become a saint. Saints make more saints, giving solid examples of humility, love and faithfulness. Their bright example challenges and encourages others to live authentic and holy lives.

You probably have seen the effects of this statistic in your own parish: $80 \%$ of young people leave the Church by the age of 23 . One of the most critical places to reach them is in college where they are thinking about who they want to be. Your support allows us to reach out to them and invite them to consider holiness.
